From Your Pastor's Heart

My Dear Friend,

I am writing this letter to you as our hearts are breaking for the people of the Ukraine. We are also learning of the chivalry of those on the front lines who are: committed to defend their freedom, risking their safety to offer relief, and who help with media coverage. We are touched by the generosity of neighbors, like those in Poland, who have been accepting strangers into their homes in the crisis. As the reports pour in, our hearts are crushed to see human agony and angst on the one hand and the tragedy of an insane war-cry on the other.

Even as such a serious matter is before us by way of global attention and magnitude, it is rather telling that one of the biggest trivia debates on social media right now (initiated by Ryan Nixon of New Zealand) has people engaged and busy in a debate. Media reports tell us that his question is exploding all over the internet. Guess what the question is? It is: "Do you think there are more doors or wheels in the world?" Can you believe that?! Has it struck you sometimes that people seem to not have much to do and therefore have much to do? History has moments like that too. For example, think of the soldiers who were casting lots for the garment of Jesus at the foot of the cross. Were they missing something of great magnitude by focusing on something trivial? They were physically close to the greatest sacrifice and salvation-gift that the universe had ever known – but they were spiritually lost in self-indulgence. They were busy hankering over a piece of cloth rather than allowing the fabric of their souls to be touched by the love of the Savior. Can you imagine bargaining over a piece of cloth while the Savior whispers, "Father, forgive them..."?

On the other hand, sometimes, trivia and entertainment might be our way of escaping from facing our bigger challenges. In John chapter 21, we find that Simon Peter tells his fellow disciples, "I'm going out to fish". Going out to fish under normal circumstances would not have been fishy at all. I know a lot of "fisherfolk" or shall we say, "fishy folk" or "fishing-loving folk "or "hook-and-net folk" (that's the ocean's competition to those "meat and potato" folk) among us who would say, "Yep". By the way, what I like a lot about the fishing industry is the end-product at a dinner table- some tenderly baked salmon with sautéed zucchini, carrots, broccoli, and a few stray shrimps on a bed of rice! Did that spell "Tawoomba"?

Let's talk about, "escape by fishing". Is there a man out there who escapes further than his man cave to the waters of the Susquehanna or Pinchot or the Bay? Every nautical mile away from shore is a sweet reprieve from that nagging spouse, those demanding kids and that low-down boss. Don't we men need a break? A distraction?

On the other hand, have you seen the joy and glee in the eyes of that woman who is out there shopping? Between the sweet aromas of the perfume section, the special offers of the new arrivals, and the fresh air and healing of the fitting/dressing room, she feels like she is lightyears away from that man who is a "mannequin in jammies". If you didn't see his finger moving to press that TV remote button, you would be the was dead! Oh, how much she wishes he would be a bit more TV free, cellphone free and shopping-spree free (especially when it came to the fishing stuff - there's no room to swim through the garage and basement anymore!). Years of training still can't seem to teach an old fish new tricks! Why do some men never get it?

Getting back to the context in John chapter 21, the disciples had been through a very intense time. After three years of following Jesus and listening to his kingdom messages, watching his grand miracles, and seeing lives transformed, they had faced 24 hours that turned their world upside down. They had watched him go through betrayal by a team member, trials blotched by prejudice, false witnesses and the cry of an angry mob that demanded his crucifixion. They witnessed their Master being beaten, broken, and nailed to the cross. The One who had raised the dead, stilled the storm, healed the paralytic, and fed the 5000 with five loaves and two fish preferred to go through all the agony without protest and without the use of his mighty power! If you were one of the disciples, would you be shaking your head and sighing, "Makes no sense at all!". I guess, that's when fishing makes sense? Or maybe hunting?

The bottom line is that, when life throws its curveballs at us, we may be tempted to snuggle into the oblivion of a tranquil lake, a quiet forest or a healing changing room, where we are surrounded by deer and fish and the lingering aromas of Estée Lauder.

As we approach another season of Passion Week and Easter, we find ourselves following the footsteps of a Savior who did not let anything distract him from his goal. Jesus said in John 10:10, "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life and have it to the full." Yes, that's why he came. The angel had told Joseph, "She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." Matthew 1:21.

Jesus knew and embraced his mission with single-minded devotion. He knew from the beginning that his journey from Bethlehem would be directed by signs which read, "This way to Calvary". No wonder, Luke 9:51 says "As the time approached for him to be taken up to heaven, Jesus resolutely set out for Jerusalem." Through the painful deceit of a disciple and the abandonment by others, he persevered. Through unjust trials, false testimonies, mean-spirited religious leaders, crowd-pleasing politicians, and the taunts of vicious folk, he persevered. Through lashes, curses, spitting, a crown of thorns and 5-to-6-inch nails in his flesh and blood, he persevered. He persevered because he wanted to save you. Don't ever forget, that he did it all for you, my friend. He left no stone unturned – not even the one that held him in the tomb – to prove his love for you.

Oh! What a Savior!

We will also have youth/volunteers from Mt. Calvary Episcopal Church, Camp Hill, who will be joining us through our connection with Parthemore Funeral Home.



Youth meetings on Sunday at 6 PM.


We have a time of hanging out with indoor games followed by singing, a Bible study from a series titled "Meant for More". Followed by a time of prayer and a snack.


